About Our School: Montgomery County High School serves students in grades 9-12. Our goal is to prepare students to be responsible members of society by developing their intellectual. physical, emotional, and social potential. Students are required to MCHS twenty-five credits to graduate. offers earn regular, Kentucky Scholars and Commonwealth Diploma comprehensive. programs. Advanced Placement and early college courses, as well as a variety of Career and Technical Education courses, are offered on campus. College courses are also offered at the Clay Community Center and Kentucky Virtual High School.

How We Ensure Educational Equity: Montgomery County High School is committed to ensuring that all students are able to achieve at a high level regardless of gender, race, disability or socioeconomic status. We provide free tutoring to all students through our Extended School Services Program. The counseling staff advises individual students on course selection and career goals. The English as a Second Language (ESL) program provides services to students who have limited English proficiency. At-risk students have been identified based on state and local assessment scores, attendance, discipline referrals, and class grades. Intervention plans are developed for our at-risk students to prevent failure. We also provide credit recovery classes to assist students in staying on track for graduation.

State Assistance (Non-Title I)

Senate Bill I, signed into law in March 2009, requires state accountability for Non-Title I schools. If a non-Title I school does not make AYP in the same content area for two consecutive years, the school will be eligible for state assistance. The description "Eligible for State Assistance" will appear in the Consequences, School Status column, followed by the number "1" or "2" indicating the number of years eligible.

How We Are Doing

Kentucky's Interim School Testing and Accountability System has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests (KCCT); readiness tests by grade level; and other measures of a school's performance, including attendance, retention and dropout rates. This interim system will be replaced in the 2011-12 school year by a new testing and accountability system structured as required by statute. The goal is that, by 2014, nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished in every subject area tested.
